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Month	Program	Highlights
January	Active Aging	Health Educators researched data for DASH diet and Plate Method presentations and continued marketing presentations and foot care clinics at senior centers and independent living communities. Fifty-two clients were served through foot care clinics and seven through home visits.
	Disease Surveillance	Michelle and Arlene completed the five day Applied Epidemiology course. All Department PHN's attended a tuberculosis workshop here on January 9. The DI's investigated three separate Norovirus outbreaks, one Influenza outbreak, and added an interjurisdictional TB case to the direct observation therapy list. Twenty-two cases of reportable diseases were investigated.
	Environmental Health	The Department was awarded \$3,000 for the 2016-2017 Radon Awareness and Risk Reduction program through DHHS. 500 short-term test kits were purchased and were distributed through the Department's office, the City of Plattsmouth, the City of Springfield, F&M Bank in Gretna, and Resurrection Church in Gretna.
	Health Hub	Health Educator continued Health Hub trainings, and scheduled colon cancer awareness presentations at senior centers for February and March.
	Maternal Child Health	The PHN's started planning for the second annual "Climb out of the Darkness" event to increase awareness of maternal mental health and raise money for Postpartum Progress. A new partnership with Baby Junk in Rockbrook Village was established in which a spring fundraiser will donate money to Postpartum Progress. Letters have been mailed to local businesses related to the lactation in the workplace initiative. Thirty-two home visits were conducted.
	Preparedness	EPC was accepted into the Immersion Program to allow for training and mentoring with fellow Emergency Response Coordinators in Nebraska.
	Safe Kids	20 community members attended the Safe Kids meeting on January 24 to discuss the future of the coalition. The car seat eligibility and distribution policy was finalized. Planning has begun for a Sarpy County Head Start bike rodeo and helmet fitting event, as well as for a similar one for Cass County.
February	Active Aging	Five senior centers scheduled "What's on Your Plate?" presentations. Research began for evidence-based programs to implement in the Active Aging program. 61 clients were served through foot care clinics and 11 through home visits.



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Disease Surveillance	29 cases of reportable diseases were investigated.
Environmental Health	Radon awareness campaign and promotion of free short-term radon test kits continued. Environmental Health Specialist worked with local cities to purchase additional mosquito-prevention supplies as part of the West Nile Virus contract extension. Staff training on the Injury Prevention Program was completed.
Health Hub	Health Educator continued making health coaching phone calls.  Sixty-nine women received the first call, nine received the second call, and two received the third call. Two women received healthy lifestyle supports.
Maternal Child Health	The PHN's convened a meeting with maternal mental health stakeholders to continue planning for the second annual fundraiser walk to promote maternal depression. Work on the lactation in the workplace initiative continues. Thirty home visits were conducted.
Preparedness	EPC attended the SNS Summit in Atlanta and Incident Command System 300 training in O'Neill. Research continued on the new Volunteer Management Plan.
Safe Kids	Safe Kids Coordinator applied for a grant from the Nebraska Department of Roads to be able to purchase additional child passenger safety seats. The program received a \$500 donation from Beardmore Chevrolet and Subaru to assist with purchasing seats.
VetSET	VetSET Coordinator assisted three veteran family members through referral of community resources and service organizations.
